Articles of Association for the Institute for Global Environmental Strategies

Authorized by the Governor of Kanagawa Prefecture on April 21, 1997 Amendments Approved by the Prime Minister of Japan on March 31, 1998 Amended on February 23, 2001

Chapter 1 General Provisions

(Name)

Article 1

This institute shall be called the Institute for Global Environmental Strategies (hereinafter "the Institute").

(Office)

Article 2

- 1. The headquarters of the Institute shall be situated at 1560-39 Kami Yamaguchi, Hayama-machi, Miura-gun, Kanagawa Prefecture.
- 2. The Institute may establish other offices where needed upon resolution of the Board of Directors.

(Objectives)

Article 3

The Institute, based on the Charter for the Establishment of the Institute for Global Environmental Strategies (hereinafter "the Charter"), shall strive to carry out policy oriented research and related activities to develop and formulate innovative policy instruments and environmental strategies for sustainable development ("Strategic Research"), aiming at creating a new paradigm for global civilization; and to make the results of the Strategic Research applicable for the policy making and decision making of a broad range of entities so that sustainable development can be achieved globally, inter alia in the Asia-Pacific Region.

(Activities)

Article 4

In order to achieve the objectives outlined in the preceding article, the Institute shall undertake the following business activities:

- conduct Strategic Research, including joint research with international organizations, national and local governments, research and academic institutions, corporations, and NGOs (hereinafter "other organizations);
- 2) conduct Strategic Research in response to requests from other organizations; and provide information and recommendations on the formulation of strategies for

sustainable development to those bodies as required;

- convene international conferences and seminars and conduct other capacity building activities (this includes co-sponsorship with other organizations);
- participate in conferences where various policies and decisions are determined and offer proposals based on the results of its Strategic Research;
- 5) invite researchers from other research and academic institutions others to participate in research, and provide training courses in areas related to the creation of strategies;
- 6) collect, arrange, and provide information related to sustainable development; and
- 7) carry out any further necessary activities to achieve the objectives of the Institute.

(Working languages)

Article 5

Working languages of the Institute shall be English and Japanese.

Chapter 2 Assets and Accounting

(Composition of assets)

Article 6

- 1. The assets of the Institute shall be comprised of the following:
 - 1) assets recorded in the List of Property as of the establishment of the Institute;
 - 2) assets received as donations from corporations or individuals after establishment;
 - voluntary contributions from governmental agencies, local governments of Japan and other interested countries;
 - 4) grants from private foundations and others;
 - 5) income generated from existing assets;
 - 6) income from fees paid by affiliates;
 - 7) income from regular activities; and
 - 8) any other income.

(Classification of assets)

Article 7

1. The assets of the Institute shall consist of the

Principal Fund and the Operating Resources.

- 2. The Institute's Principal Fund shall be composed of the following:
 - 1) assets listed in the Principal Fund category in the List of Property as of establishment;
 - 2) assets donated specifically to the Principal Fund; and
 - 3) assets that are transferred to the Principal Fund by resolution of the Board of Directors.
- 3. The Operating Resources shall be those other than the Principal Fund.

(Administration of the assets)

Article 8

- 1. The assets of the Institute shall be administered by the Chair of the Board of Directors using methods decided by the Chair upon resolution of the Board of Directors.
- 2. Cash contained in the Principal Fund and the Strategic Research Fund must be preserved using safe and reliable methods that include establishing postal time-deposit accounts or bank time-deposit accounts; entrusting the funds with a trust bank; or purchasing government or corporate bonds.

(Restrictions on the disposal of the Principal Fund)

Article 9

The Principal Fund may not be disposed of or used as collateral. However, in the case where there are unavoidable circumstances when carrying out the activities of the Institute, a portion of the Principal Fund may be disposed of, or all or a portion of the Principal Fund may be used as collateral upon resolution of two-thirds or more of the current number of members of the Board of Directors, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the approval of the Minister of the Environment

(Strategic Research Fund)

Article 10

- The Strategic Research Fund shall be set up to ensure that operations are carried out smoothly. The Strategic Research Fund shall be composed of the following categories of assets:
 - 1) donated assets designated as assets for the Strategic Research Fund; and
 - 2) assets that are transferred to the Strategic Research Fund by resolution of the Board of Directors.
- 2. The Strategic Research Fund may not be disposed of or used as collateral. However, in the case where there are unavoidable circumstances when carrying out the activities of the Institute, upon resolution of two-thirds or more of the current

(Payment of expenses)

Article 11

The expenses of the Institute shall be paid from the Operating Resources.

(Business plans and budget)

Article 12

The documents for the Institute's annual business plans and the annual budget necessary for such business plans shall be prepared by the Chair of the Board of Directors. Prior to the start of each fiscal year, these documents must be submitted to the Minister of the Environment an upon resolution of more than one-half of the current number of the members of the Board of Directors after receiving the comments by the Board of Trustees. Any revisions to these documents must also follow the same process.

(Provisional budget)

Article 13

- 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of the preceding article, when the budget for income and expenditures is not formulated due to compelling reasons, the Chair of the Board of Directors may, upon resolution of the Board of Directors, exercise control over revenue and expenses in accordance with the budget of the previous fiscal year until a new budget is formulated.
- 2. The budget for revenue and expenses referred to in the preceding clause shall become the revenue and expenditures for the newly formulated budget.

(Business reports and settlement of revenue and expenses)

Article 14

 The Institute's business reports and settlement statements shall be prepared by the Chair of the Board of Directors at the end of each fiscal year and shall include the Business Report, Statements of Revenue and Expenses, Report on Changes in Net Assets, Balance Sheets, and the List of Property. After receiving the auditor's inspection and upon resolution of more than one-half of the current number of the members of the Board of Directors, these documents must be reported to the Board of Trustees and they, within three months after the close of the fiscal year, must be submitted to the Minister of the Environment . In this case, if any revisions were made to the amount of the total of assets, it should be registered within two weeks, and a certified copy of the registration should be attached to these documents.

2. When there are surplus funds in the Institute's revenue and expenses settlement, upon resolution of the Board of Directors all or a portion of this surplus shall be transferred into the Principal Fund or appropriated forward to the next fiscal year.

(Long-term borrowings)

Article 15

When the Institute seeks to borrow funds, upon resolution of two-thirds or more of the current number of members of the Board of Directors and with the approval of the Board of Trustees, authorization must be obtained from the Minister of the Environment, except for the payment of short-term borrowings with income from that fiscal year.

(Assumption of responsibilities and waiver of rights)

Article 16

In cases corresponding to the provision of Article 9 or provisions in previous articles and with the exception of those matters determined by the budget for revenue and expenses, notice must be served to the Minister of the Environment upon resolution of more than one-half of the current number of the members of the Board of Directors and with the approval of the Board of Trustees, when the Institute seeks to assume additional responsibilities or waive rights.

(Fiscal year)

Article 17

The Institute's fiscal year shall begin on April 1 of each year and end on March 31 of the following year.

Chapter 3 Officers

(Types and number of officers)

Article 18

- 1. he Institute shall have the following officers:
 - 1) Directors

The Institute shall have at least 15 and no more than 25 Directors.

2) Auditors There shall be two Auditors.

- 2. Among the Directors, one-half of the current number of Directors plus one shall be persons of Japanese nationality. In the case the current number is odd, the terms "the current number of Directors" shall signify "the current number minus one".
- 3. Among the Directors, there shall be one Chair of the Board of Directors.
- 4. Among the Directors, there shall be one or two Vice-Chair(s).
- 5. Among the Directors, there shall be one President.
- 6. Among the Directors, there may be one Vice-President.
- 7. Among the Directors, there shall be one Managing Director.

(Elections and other matters)

Article 19

- 1. The Directors and Auditors shall be elected by the Board of Trustees.
- 2. The Directors shall mutually elect the Chair of the Board of Directors, one or two Vice-Chair(s), the President, the Vice-President and the Managing Director.
- 3. The Directors, Auditors, and Trustees cannot simultaneously serve in another position.
- 4. The number of Directors that are relatives or have special mutual relations shall not exceed one-third of the total number of Directors.
- 5. The Auditors shall not be relatives or have special mutual relationships.
- 6. Any changes among the Directors shall be registered within two weeks and reported without delay to the Minister of the Environment together with a certified copy of the register.
- 7. Any changes among Auditors shall be reported without delay to the Minister of the Environment.

(Duties)

Article 20

- 1. The Chair of the Board of Directors shall represent the Institute and exercise general control over the business thereof.
- The Vice-chair(s) shall assist the Chair of the Board of Directors and in the event that the Chair becomes incapacitated or is absent, a designated Vice-Chair shall execute the duties of the office of the Chair in accordance with the previously determined intentions of the Chair in an order determined by resolution of the Board of Directors.
- 3. The President shall direct the operation of Strategic Research, its related training and other matters of the Institute as stipulated in Article 42.

- 4. The Vice-President shall assist the President and execute the duties of the office of the President in the event that the President becomes incapacitated or is absent.
- 5. The Managing Director shall assist the Chair of the Board of Directors and the Vice-Chair(s) and shall, under the guidance of the Chair and the Vice-Chair(s), exercise control over and dispose of the ordinary business of the Institute which is not within the duties of the office of the President.
- 6. The Directors shall comprise the Board of Directors, and they must resolve matters related to the business of the Institute in accordance with the provisions under these Articles of Association.

(Duties of the Auditors)

Article 21

The Auditors shall:

- 1) audit assets and accounting;
- 2) audit the execution of business activities by the Directors;
- report irregularities found through the auditing of assets, accounting, and the execution of business activities to the Board of Directors and the Board of Trustees, or the Minister of the Environment; and
- 4) when it is necessary to report on matters in the preceding item, request a convening of or convene the meetings of the Board of Directors and the Board of Trustees.

(Terms of office)

Article 22

- 1. The terms of office for the Officers shall be three years. However, officers shall not be prevented from being reelected to a second term.
- 2. The terms of office for Officers who are elected as replacements or elected as additional Officers shall be the time remaining in the term of any predecessor or the same as the terms of the present Officers.
- 3. Even after resigning or following the expiration of a term of office, Officers must carry out the duties of their position until a successor takes office.

(Dismissal)

Article 23

When one of the following matters applies to an Officer, the Officer may be dismissed by resolutions of at least two-thirds majorities of both the Board of Directors or the Board of Trustees, based on the current number of Directors or Trustees. In the case of such dismissal, an opportunity must be given to

- 1) When it is recognized that the Officer is unable to execute the duties of the position because of psychological or physical problems
- 2) When it is recognized that the officer has violated an obligation of the duties of the position or if the Officer carries out any activity that is inappropriate for an Officer

(Remuneration and others)

Article 24

- 1. Officers shall not be remunerated. However, fulltime officers may be remunerated.
- 2. Officers may be reimbursed for expenses.
- 3. The Chair may decide on reimbursement for necessary matters related to the preceding two clauses upon resolution of the Board of Directors.

Chapter 4 The Board of Directors

(Composition)

Article 25

The Board of Directors shall consist of Directors.

(Authority)

Article 26

In addition to matters separately determined by the provisions under these Articles of Association, the Board of Directors shall decide on and execute all matters of importance related to the business activities of the Institute.

(Types and convening of the meetings of the Board of Directors)

Article 27

- 1. There shall be two types of meetings of the Board of Directors: the ordinary meeting of the Board of Directors and the extraordinary meeting of the Board of Directors.
- 2. The ordinary meeting of the Board of Directors shall convene twice each year.
- 3. The extraordinary meeting of the Board of Directors shall convene in any of the following cases:
 - 1) when the Chair of the Board of Directors recognizes that such a convening is necessary;
 - when there is a request to convene by onethird or more of the current number of members, with a request stating in writing the

purpose of the convening of the Board of Directors; and

3) when there is a request to convene by an Auditor, as stipulated in item 4 of Article 21.

(Calling of Meetings)

Article 28

- 1. The Chair of the Board of Directors shall call meetings of the Board of Directors.
- 2. The Chair of the Board of Directors must call the extraordinary meetings of the Board of Directors within 20 days in the case of items 2 and 3 of clause 3 in the preceding Article.
- 3. When calling of the ordinary meeting of the Board of Directors, notification in writing that states the time and date, place, purpose, and articles for deliberation must be made at least 30 days prior to the convening of the meeting. However, this shall not apply when all Directors agree to convene the meeting.

(Chair of meeting)

Article 29

The Chair of the Board of Directors shall also serve as meeting chair.

(Quorum)

Article 30

Meetings of the Board of Directors may not be convened unless more than a half of the current number of Directors are in attendance.

(Resolutions)

Article 31

Except as otherwise provided for by the provisions in these Articles of Association, the resolutions of the meeting of the Board of Directors shall be decided upon by a majority vote of the Directors. In the case of an equal number votes for approval and disapproval, the matter shall be decided by the Chair of the meeting.

(Voting in writing and others)

Article 32

- Any Director unable to attend the meeting due to unavoidable circumstances may vote in writing on the matters on which notification has been made beforehand, or another Director may be commissioned to vote as a proxy for the absent Director.
- 2. With regard to the application of provisions in the preceding two articles in the case where a

Director is unable to attend as stipulated in the preceding clause, the Director shall nevertheless be regarded as having attended the meeting.

(Minutes)

Article 33

- 1. The minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors shall be prepared and must contain the following matters:
 - 1) The date, time, and place of meeting
 - The current number of Directors, the names and number of Directors in attendance. (Persons voting in writing and commissioned to vote by proxy shall be noted in the minutes.)
 - 3) Matters deliberated and matters voted on
 - 4) A summary and the results of the proceedings
 - 5) Matters relating to the election of signatories to the minutes
- 2. The Chair of the meeting and two or more persons elected to sign the minutes of the meeting must sign and affix their seals to the minutes.

Chapter 5 Trustees and the Board of Trustees

(Trustees)

Article 34

- 1. The Institute shall have at least 25 and no more than 35 Trustees.
- 2. Trustees shall be elected by the Board of Directors, and shall be commissioned by the Chair of the Board of Directors.
- 3. The Trustees shall be the persons commissioned by national administrative organizations and international organizations that have signed the Charter or persons of knowledge and experience.
- 4. The provisions in Articles 22,23, and 24 shall be applied mutatis mutandis to the Trustees. In this case, the term "officer" used in these articles shall read as "Trustee."

(Board of Trustees)

Article 35

The Board of Trustees shall be composed of Trustees.

(Authority of the Board of Trustees)

Article 36

The Board of Trustees shall carry out the duties stipulated in these Articles of Association, deliberate and provide advice to the Chair of the Board of Directors on matters related to the business of the Institute, in response to requests from the Chair of the Board of Directors or when the Board of Trustees recognizes that such deliberation and advice are needed.

(Calling of Meeting)

Article 37

- 1. Meeting of the Board of Trustees shall be called by the Chair of the Board of Directors.
- 2. The Chair of the Board of Directors must convene the Board of Trustees within 20 days, when there is a written request stating the purpose to convene by one-third or more of the current number of Trustee members.

(Election of the Chair)

Article 38

The Chair of the meeting of the Board of Trustees shall be mutually elected by the Trustees.

(Quorum, resolutions and voting in writing and others)

Article 39

The provisions in Articles 30 to 33 shall be applicable mutatis mutandis to the Trustees. In this case, the terms "Board of Directors" and "Directors" used in the mentioned articles shall read as "Board of Trustees" and "Trustees".

(Other)

Article 40

In addition to the provisions in this article, the Board of Directors shall determine necessary matters related to the operation of the Board of Trustees.

Chapter 6 Honorary Advisors and Counselors

(Honorary Advisors and Counselors)

Article 41

- 1. The Institute may have Honorary Advisors and Counselors.
- 2. Honorary Advisors and Counselors shall be appointed by the Chair of the Board of Directors upon the recommendation of the Board of Directors.
- 3. The Honorary Advisors shall respond to inquiries from the Chair of the Board of Directors regarding basic matters and may provide advice to the President.
- 4. The Counselors shall respond to inquiries from

the Chair of the Board of Directors regarding important business matters and may provide advice to the President.

5. The terms of office for both the Honorary Advisors and the Counselors shall be three years. However, the Honorary Advisors and the Counselors are not prevented from being reappointed.

Chapter 7 Research Structure

(Duties of the President)

Article 42

The president shall execute the following duties based on resolutions made by the Board of Directors:

- 1) decide on Strategic Research plans and manage their implementation;
- prepare annual reports on Strategic Research and its related training and report to the members of both the Board of Directors and the Board of Trustees;
- appoint and dismiss research fellows and other related staff;
- 4) decide on necessary matters related to Strategic Research and its related training;
- 5) direct the operation of Strategic Research and its related training.

(Research Advisory Committee)

Article 43

- 1. The Institute shall have a Research Advisory Committee which is an advisory body for promotion of Strategic Research.
- 2. The Research Advisory Committee provides the President with advice on matters related to promotion of Strategic Research, such as decisions on Strategic Research plans and management of their implementation.
- 3. The Members of the Research Advisory Committee shall be appointed by the Chair of the Board of Directors in consultation with the President.
- 4. The Members of the Research Advisory Committee shall be the persons commissioned by research and academic institutions that have signed the Charter or persons of knowledge and experience.
- 5. The terms of office for the Members of the Research Advisory Committee shall be three years. However, the Members are not prevented from being reappointed.
- 6. The terms of office for the Members of the Research Advisory Committee who are elected as replacements or elected as additional Members shall be the time remaining in the term of any

predecessor or the same as the terms of the present Members.

7. In addition to matters stipulated in the preceding clauses, necessary matters related to the Research Advisory Committee shall be decided by the Chair of the Board of Directors subject to resolution of the Board of Directors.

(Research fellows and other related staff)

Article 44

- 1. The Institute shall have senior research fellows, research fellows, research associates and visiting research fellows.
- 2. Visiting research fellows shall belong to other organizations and engage in the Strategic Research.
- 3. The senior research fellows, research fellows, research associates and visiting research fellows shall be appointed and dismissed by the President.
- 4. Necessary matters related to senior research fellows and others shall be decided by the President subject to resolution of the Board of Directors.

(Trainees)

Article 45

- 1. In addition to those persons belonging to the Institute, the Institute may have other persons participate in the Strategic Research as trainees.
- 2. Necessary decisions regarding trainees shall be made by the President subject to resolution of the Board of Directors.

Chapter 8 Secretariat

(Establishment)

Article 46

- 1. A Secretariat shall be installed to carry out the business of the Institute.
- 2. The Secretariat shall have a Secretary-General and necessary staff.
- 3. The Secretary-General and staff shall be appointed and dismissed by the Chair of the Board of Directors. Upon appointment or dismissal of staff involved in research activities, however, the Secretary General shall consult the President.
- 4. The Chair of the Board of Directors shall decide on matters necessary for the Institute and operation of the Secretariat subject to resolution of the Board of Directors.

(Books and documents to be furnished)

Article 47

The office of the Secretariat must always keep the following records and documents:

- 1) the Articles of Association for the Institute;
- 2) a list and the resumes of Directors, Auditors, Trustees, Members of Research Advisory Committee, Research Fellows, Research Associates and other staff;
- 3) documents on permission, authorization, and registration;
- 4) documents on the proceedings of the Institute set forth in the Articles of Association;
- 5) records and documentary evidence for revenue and expenses;
- 6) documents indicating the status of the assets and liabilities and the situation regarding net assets; and
- 7) other necessary documents and records.

Chapter 9 Affiliates

(Affiliates)

Article 48

- Individual persons and corporations who endorse the objectives and activities of the Institute may become affiliates of the Institute according to the rules determined by the Chair of the Board of Directors upon resolution by the Board of Directors.
- 2. The affiliates can participate in the business activities of the Institute and obtain information on results of Strategic Research and related matters.
- 3. The affiliates shall pay the prescribed fees according to the rules stipulated in clause 1 of this Article.

Chapter 10 Amendments to the Articles of Association and Dissolution of the Institute

(Amendments to the Articles of Association)

Article 49

These Articles of Association may be amended only with the approval of the Minister of the Environment after approval by three-fourths or more of the current number of members of the Board of Directors and three-fourths or more of the current numbe of members of the Board of Trustees.

(Dissolution)

Article 50

The Institute may be dissolved only in accordance with the provisions set forth in items 2 through 4 of clause 1 under Article 68 of the Japanese Civil Law and with the approval of the Minister of the Environment after resolution of three-fourths or more of the current number of members of the Board of Directors and three-fourths or more of the current number of members of the Board of Trustees.

(Disposition of residual assets)

Article 51

The residual assets at the time of the dissolution of the Institute shall be donated to institutions that operate with similar objectives or returned to the party which donated the concerned assets to the Institute, subject to the approval of the Minister of the Environment after the resolution of threefourths or more of the current number of members of the Board of Directors and three-fourths or more of the current number of members of the Board of Trustees.

Chapter 11 Supplementary Provisions

(Commission)

Article 52

In addition to matters stipulated in these Articles of Association, necessary matters relating to the operations of the Institute shall be decided separately by the Chair subject to resolution of the Board of Directors.

Additional provisions

- 1. These Articles of Association become effective on March 31, 1998.
- 2. Clause 2 of Article 18 shall become effective on and after March 31, 1999.
- 3. The President of the Institute shall serve as the Chair of the Board of Directors, until the first meeting of the Board of Directors of the Institution, which is to be held after March 31, 1998.
- Notwithstanding the provisions set forth in clause 7 of Article 18, the position of Managing Director may be vacant until an appropriate date.
- 5. Regardless of the provisions set forth in clause 5 of Article 43, terms of the Research Advisors selected by the Chair of the Board of Directors shall end on March 31, 1999. This is also in accordance with clause 3 of the same Article.

Owing to support from friends, IGES will be finishing the First Phase (FY1997-2000) of its strategic research at the end of March 2001, and will begin the Second Phase (FY2001-2003) in April. Projects on Climate Policy (previously called Climate Change in the First Phase), Urban Environmental Management, Forest Conservation, and Environmental Education will continue their research activities into the next phase with some renewals, based on the achievements from the First Phase. The projects of New Development Patterns and Environmental Governance of the First Phase have been dissolved to form a new project that deals with cross-cutting issues called *Long-Term Perspective and Policy Integration Research*. In addition, project researches will be conducted on new themes of Business and Environment and Information Technology Revolution and Environment. Following last year's opening of the Kitakyushu Office, the Kansai Research Center opened in Kobe this year with overall support from the prefectural government of Hyogo. The research of the new *Environmental Industry Project* will be conducted at this center.

As for researchers who will be engaged in project research, most researchers from the First Phase will continue their research in the Second Phase based on their performance reviews, along with some ten new researchers. In addition, IGES is thinking of establishing projects other than the ones mentioned above (e.g. *Freshwater Resources Management*). The projects on new themes including the project themes recruited openly, may not be launched in time of the start of the new phase in April, but they will hopefully be established before the end of this fiscal year, or the next fiscal year.

As for the Project Research in the First Phase, the report of each project will be completed before the end of March 2001. The achievement will be publicized as well as reviewed from outside the institute by the members of the Research Advisory Committee.

The role of IGES is increasing in importance as we enter "the century of environment". In the first three years after its establishment, IGES was able to achieve results that exceeded its expectations. IGES owes this to great support and cooperation from other organizations outside Japan, as well as those inside, and is beginning to be internationally recognized. On behalf of all my colleagues at IGES, I would like to promise that we will do our best in continuing our research toward the sustainable development of the global environment, and express our warmest thanks to your cooperation and support.

Presenting Research Results at ECO ASIA 2000 and ESCAP/MECD 2000

Putting Forward Policy Recommendations and Hosting the IGES Seminar

The 9th Environment Congress for Asia and the Pacific (ECO ASIA 2000), hosted by Environment Agency of Japan, and the Ministerial Conference on Environment and Development in Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP/MCED 2000), hosted by United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific), were held from 31 August to 5 September 2000 in Kitakyushu Japan.

These conferences were two of the most important meetings held to discuss regional actions for realizing sustainable development in Asia and the Pacific and to prepare for the World Summit on Sustainable Development (Rio+10) which is scheduled for the year 2002 in the Republic of South Africa. At the conferences, over 200 participants, including Environment Ministers from each country and region discussed the issues actively.

Among the major outcomes of the conferences, ESCAP/MCED adopted 1) Ministerial Declaration on Environment and Development in Asia and the Pacific, 2) Regional Action Programme for Environmentally Sound and Sustainable Development 2001-2005, 3) Vision for the 21st Century: the Regional Message for the 10-Year Review of UNCED, and 4)

ECO ASIA

Environment Congress for Asia and the Pacific Established in 1999 as a forum for high level government officials and representatives from international organizations to environmental policy in Asia and the Pacific region. Held annually (except 1992).

ESCAP/MCED

United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific / Ministerial Conference on Environment and Development: United Nations regional conference to review the state of the environment and settle regional action programs to tackle environment and development issues in Asia and the Pacific. The first meeting was held in 1985 and has been held every half-decade since then.

Kitakyushu Initiative for a Clean Environment. *The Kitakyushu Office and the Urban Environmental Management Project of IGES were assigned key roles to help materialize the Kitakyushu Initiative in the future.

IGES identified these conferences as a good opportunity to put forward policy recommendations based on strategic research outcomes and submitted a policy recommendation document "Policy implications in addressing critical environment and sustainable development issues of the region" and a background information paper entitled "Specific issues on sustainable development in Asia and the Pacific" to the Preparatory Meeting of Senior Officials of ESCAP/MCED (31 August - 2 September). Mr. Kazuo Matsushita (Acting Vice-president of IGES) made a keynote speech, introducing the points of IGES recommendations to ministerial level participants of ECO ASIA (3 September). The policy recommendations brought by IGES were widely welcomed and active discussion revolved around them through the series of conferences. The outcome of the discussion was reflected in the Chair's Summary of ECO ASIA and other documents adopted by ESCAP/MCED.

Besides the main conference, IGES also introduced its strategic research activities and disseminated its research outcomes to multiple stakeholders by putting up posters and hosting a seminar

Outline of Kitakyushu Initiative for a Clean Environment

In studying the experiences in urban environmental management and the actual state of international cooperation in Asian countries, the Urban Environment Project (UE) collected and submitted a report to the 4th Ministerial Conference on Environment and Development in Asia and the Pacific, organized by the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UN/ESCAP). The report proclaimed to strengthen local initiatives to improve urban environmental management in countries throughout the Asia-Pacific region, and outlined the necessity of environmental cooperation on an international scale. It is this the Kitakyushu Initiative for a Clean Environment (hereafter referred to as the "Kitakyushu Initiative") that was adopted at the conference, based on that report.

In considering Kitakyushu's rich experience in the field of environmental measures. yushu Initiative aims ostengthen actions at the local brevit interactions yushu Initiative aims to strengthen actions at the local local local to among nent in urban areas in Asia and the Pacific, and promote cooperation among cities. Concrete work issues for promotion of the Kitakyushu Initiative are the identification of quantitative indicators to assess urban environmental improvement, the implementation of pilot programs for improvements in urban environment, and the establishment of the Kitakyushu Initiative Network.

Though the Kitakyushu Initiative was endorsed and is being promoted among the national governments of the member and associate member status of ESCAP, the concrete work issues as the identification of quantitative indicators, planning and implementation of pilot programs, survey and analysis of best practices, and establishment of the network will be handled by IGES



The Sixth Conference of the Parties of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Cha

TThe Sixth Conference of the Parties of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP6) was held between November 13-25, 2000 in the Hague, the Netherlands.

The most significant objective of COP6 was to decide on rules in making the Kyoto Protocol fully operational. In spite of vigorous negotiations by ministers under the leadership of Mr. Pronk, the President of the climate change talks, a final agreement could not be reached. IGES, however, was able to carry out activities to promote the negotiations, such as by holding a seminar at the venue.



Ever since the Buenos Aires Conference of the Parties of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP4), IGES has been presenting its research outputs at all COP sessions under UNFCCC in the form of "Special Events". At COP 6 in the Hague, IGES, led by the Climate Change Project, held a seminar entitled "Cooperation and Competition for Implementation of the Kyoto Regime", which drew about 100 participants.

Dr. Naoki Matsuo, Senior Research Fellow of IGES, began the seminar with a keynote presentation on the comprehensive aspects for future development of the Kyoto regime from short-term (rule design of the Kyoto Protocol and domestic policies and measures design) to long-term perspectives with a scale of hundreds of years, and from internationally cooperative relations to competitive character of the Kyoto mechanisms. The elements of the presentation were: possible key decisions at COP 6; domestic policies and measures portfolios with good practices; channels to promote cooperation between South and North; concrete questions left for CDM and its aspect of new opportunities and concerns in the emissions market; Post-1st Commitment period issues; and a key message by IPCC Special Report on Emission Scenarios from very long-term perspective.

This keynote was followed by a round table discussion, chaired by Prof. Akio Morishima, the chair of the board of directors of IGES, which invited distinguished experts around the world. Prof. Stephen Schneider of Stanford University, one of the most famous scientists in the field of climate change (IPCC WG I and II), spoke on climate change issue from broad and long-term perspectives. Dr. Bert de Vries from the RIVM of the Netherlands supported his argument based on his modeling outputs (IPCC WG III). Prof. Michael Grubb of Imperial College of London and Royal Institute of



International Affairs expressed his original points on the implementation of the Protocol and its longterm implications (WG III). Dr. Zhou Dadi, Director General of Energy Research Institute, China, analyzed the climate issue from the point of view of energy and developing countries (WG III). Dr. Michael Walsh, an environmental broker in Chicago, dealt with the issue based on market aspects and discussed the newly emerging emissions market with a proposal to remove barriers associated with it. Finally, Dr. RaeKwon Chung, the chief negotiator of Korean Delegation, requested researchers about further policy-relevant study area from the perspective of Korea that is an OECD member but not an Annex I Party.

In spite of a wide range of discussions by IPCC scientists, market experts and negotiators, the discussion had clear and qualified messages for the effective mitigation to climate change by designing rules and/or choosing options to maximize "cobenefits".

Policy Dialogue Workshops

From June to September last year, the Forest Conservation Project held Policy Dialogue Workshops about investigations targeted at three countries for the purpose of devising policy proposals in forest conservation. These workshops invited government officials, researchers, and representatives from NGOs from the targeted countries. Through 'bottom up' processes, discussions were aimed at drafting the elements for forest conservation that IGES had presented, and policy recommendations for sustainable forest management. In each workshop, discussions based on the real situation of each region were held, and meaningful results about the practical schemes for policy proposals were obtained. In addition, the co-organizers of the series of workshops agreed to continue the collaboration in the second phase.

1) Workshop in Jakarta

Date: June 27& 28, 2000

Location: Indonesian Institute of Sciences (Jakarta, Republic of Indonesia)

Organizers: IGES and Indonesian Institute of Sciences

Participants: participants connected with forestry departments in Indonesia and the Philippines, representatives from local NGOs, and others related to JICA (about forty participants).

Summary of discussions: Comments based on the real situation of Indonesia and the Philippines, regarding the draft of elements for forest conservation strategies that IGES presented, were gathered. In particular, the primary causes for the destruction of forests in the regions concerned, and suggestions and opinions for the revision of the Policy Recommendations for Participatory Forest Management were raised, so that it was possible to reexamine the draft for forest conservation strategies.

2) Workshop in Vientiane

Date: August 2 & 3, 2000

Location: National University of Laos (Vientiane, The Lao People's Democratic Republic) Organizers: IGES and the National University of Laos



Participants: participants connected with departments of agriculture and forestry in the governments, universities and NGOs in Lao PDR and Vietnam, and the forestry sector in Cambodia (about 40 participants)

Summary of discussions: Comments based on the real situation of Laos and Vientiane, regarding the draft of elements for forest conservation strategies that was presented by IGES, were gathered. In particular, opinions and suggestions for revision of each country's strategies for participatory forest management in the relevant regions were raised, and the draft of forest conservation strategies was reexamined.

3) Workshop in Khabarovsk

Date: September 19-21, 2000

Location: Economic Research Institute, Russian Academy of Sciences, Far Eastern Division (Khabarovsk, Russian Republic)

Sponsors: Khabarovskiy krai Administration, the Economic Researches Institute, the Far Eastern Representative of World Wildlife Fund, IGES, the Forest Tendencies (USA), the Far Eastern Forestry Research Institute, Friends of the Earth Japan, Ecodal (local environmental NGO)

Participants: participants connected with the forestry sector in the state of Khabarkovsk, and participants from groups (Japan, China, US) who are developing forest conservation research and activities in the Russian Far East (about 70 participants)

Summary of discussions: Comments based on the real situation of the Russian Far East, regarding the draft of elements for forest conservation strategies that was submitted by IGES, were obtained. In particular, instructive suggestions regarding the main structural causes of the destruction of forests were collected, and it was decided that they will continue to reexamine the draft for forest conservation strategies in the relevant regions.

Acid Rain 2000

Acid Rain 2000 (Sixth International Workshop on Acid Rain) was held from December 10 to 16, 2000 in Tsukuba. This workshop is being held every five years since 1975, and has had significant influence on formulating the treaty at the Convention on Long-Range Transboundary Air pollution of 1979. Although the past five workshops were all held in the US or Europe, the workshop in Tsukuba was the first workshop held in Asia. It was due to the fact pointed out by the organizers that the region may be seriously affected by acid rain in the future.

Researchers from all over the world, including Japan, Korea, China, and Thailand as well as the US and countries in Europe attended the workshop. Discussions were held on a wide range of topics ranging from cause, effect, transport, and expansion mechanisms of acid rain; effects on bio-ecclogy and preventive measures; environmental education; to reports of regional studies. The iges Environmental Governance Project made a presentation entitled "The Politics of Regional Cooperation on Acid Rain Control in East Asia".

What's New from IGES [Jan. 2001]

Dissemination of Open Forum Results to the World

IGES publicized the outcome of discussions at the IGES Open Forums to Address Global Warming.

At COP conferences, national governments and research institutes are given booths where they can publicize policies of their countries along with their results. IGES too distributed an 18-page booklet containing discussions from IGES Open Forums, with the purpose of informing to the world that mitigation measures for global warming are steadily of informing to the world that mingation measures for global warming are steadily being developed by public discussions in Japan. All 1,000 copies that were brought to the venue were snapped up in an instant. In addition, at the time of COP6, a conference of Global Legislators Organization for a Balanced Environment (GLOBE) was hosted by the Dutch parliament, where Dr. Shuzo Nishioka, the project leader of IGES Climate Change Project, was invited as a speaker. Referring to the results of IGES Open Forums, Description of the participant of the participant of the state of Dr. Nishioka lead lively discussions by explaining the current conditions of environmental tax, emissions trading, and technology development in Japan.

IGES hosted a total of seven Open Forums to Address Global Warming in Tokyo between January and July of 2000. The purpose of this open public forum was to encourage public discussions on how to structure domestic policies to comply with the emission reduction targets set in the Kyoto Protocol. Fourteen speakers representing the industry, academic circles, NGOs, and think-tanks made suggestions covering almost all areas of academic circles, NGOS, and minic tanks made suggestions covering almost all areas of discussion including carbon tax, domestic emission trading, measures taken voluntarily, and promotion of technological development. Each presentation was followed by a lively half-day discussion by panelists and participants. (Please refer to the March 2000 issue of this Newsletter) Owing to these forums, common recognition or differences in opinions about each policy were

grasped, which led to comparative analysis of the effectiveness of suggestions, methods for realization, and problems. Two reports of the results were submitted to a committee in the Central Environment Council, and are being applied in the policy making process of the government of Japan.

A booklet containing summaries of the discussions entitled "Global Warming Debate in Japan" is currently being distributed in English and Japanese.

The 2nd Policy Dialogue between Japan and Germany for Facilitating Coordinated Measures to Address Global Warming: International Climate Policy & the IT-Sector

On November 13 and 14, 2000, IGES and Wuppertal Institute for Climate, Environment and Energy, one of the signatory institutes of IGES, co-organized a workshop The 2nd Policy Dialogue between Japan and Germany for Facilitating Coordinated Measures to Address Global Warming: International Climate Policy & the IT-Sector" in Wuppertal, Germany.

This workshop had two objectives. One was to offer industry representatives, researchers, and government officials an opportunity to exchange information and ideas on technologies and policies that have become increasingly important today in the digital era in terms of the impact on the environment. Another was to provide a forum for industry and government representatives to facilitate a constructive dialogue on a policy framework that can support the industry's efforts for the global warming.

The participants numbered about 30 in total, including Prof. Morishima, Chair of Board of Directors of IGES, Dr. Hennicke, Acting Prof. Morshina, Chair of Board of Directors of IGES, Dr. Hennicke, Acting President of Wuppertal Institute, as well as industry representatives from NTT, NEC Corporation, Fujitsu Limited, Sony Corporation, Matsushita Electric Industrial Co., Ltd., Siemens AG, IBM Informationssysteme Deutschland, and ICL Belgium. The focus of the workshop was on such themes as green house gas emission trends caused by use of the Internet, energy efficiency of IT products, ecolabeling of IT products and green procument chemes of IT products, eco-labeling of IT products, and green procurement schem of IT products.

The results of the discussions were reported at the COP6 side event organized by IGES and the Wuppertal Institute on November 23.

IPCC Report on Good Practice Guidance and Uncertainty Management in National Greenhouse Gas Inventories

The Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice (SBSTA) of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) requested the Intergovernmental Panel reamwork Convention on Climate Change (Director) requested the intergovernmental Patien on Climate Change (IPCC) to compile a report entitled the IPCC Report on Good Practice Guidance and Uncertainty Management in National Greenhouse Gas Inventories. This report was published by the Technical Support Unit (TSU) of the IPCC National Greenhouse Gas Inventories Programme (IPCC-NGGIP) hosted by IGES in Hayama.

The report provides improved and state-of-the-art understanding of how uncertainties may be managed in producing emissions estimates suitable for the purposes of the UNFCCC and for the scientific work associated with greenhouse gas inventories. Countries will benefit from the Good Practice Guidance and the Uncertainty Management shown in the report, which will enhance the credibility of national greenhouse gas inventories which are indispensable for the implementation of Kyoto Protocol.

The SBSTA endorsed good practice guidance as an elaboration of the Revised 1996 IPCC Guidelines for National Greenhouse Gas Inventories and recommended its use in the preparation Guidelines for varional oreenhouse Gas inventiones and recommended its use in the preparation of national greenhouse gas inventories. It also concluded that good practice guidance should be applied by Annex I Parties of the Convention to the extent possible for inventories due in 2001 and 2002 and the use of it will become mandatory in 2003 and beyond. The use by countries with economies in transition included in Annex I may be phased in two years later than other Annex I parties. SBSTA also encouraged Non-Annex I

Parties to apply good practice guidance as appropriate and to the extent possible, in the preparation of their greenhouse gas inventories. In addition, the Report was distributed to the UNFCCC Parties at its Sixth Session of the Conference of the Parties (COP6).

With a view to the wider dissemination of good practice guidance, the full text of the report is available on the internet and may be downloaded for free. Looking Back on the Completion of the First Phase of IGES Project Research Akio Morishima

The First Phase of IGES project research that began in April 1998 lasted for three years and was completed at the end of March this year. At the beginning, the five research projects of Climate Change, Urban Environmental Management, Forest Conservation, Environmental Education, and Environmental Governance were launched. However, from July 1998 the New Development Patterns Project began, leading to a total of six projects. In addition, the Capacity Building Program conducted research in collaboration with other international organizations, developing an on-line educational correspondence course and software that is called an e-Learning program. Although there were some changes to the number of researchers who were in charge of these IGES activities in the three-year-period, the number of researchers totaled to 49 and the members of the Secretariat amount to 33, including 17 parttime workers. Of the total, 19 were non-Japanese.

Regarding the research achievements of the six projects, each of the projects submitted a report at the time of completion of the research period. After being reviewed by a research advisory committee within IGES and specialists outside of IGES, there are plans to compile and publicly evaluate the research reports of the First Phase in autumn, this year. Therefore, the details shall be reported to everyone in the final reports, but here I will simply outline the research activities of each project. The main research theme of the First Phase of the Climate Change Project was the Kyoto Mechanisms of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change. The Project carried out state-of-the-art information gathering, analysis and research for technical discussions regarding the workings of emissions trading and potential of CDM which are both part of the Kyoto Mechanisms. These results were disseminated to outside of IGES in the form of workshops and forums. This is a practical research project that aims at contributing to policy formation at COP6.

The Urban Environmental Management Project conducted case studies in several cities in Japan, China and Korea, with cooperation from researchers in each country. It has analyzed the data that was obtained from field studies and various kinds of statistics, and environmental management models which are created according to the state of development of cities. The project conducted practical research with a limited budget and manpower. Since the research examined theoretical models through quantitative analysis of data acquired through limited manpower and budget I cannot say that the research was sufficient in the First Phase. However, the expectations of the external researchers for research achievements are great, and they intend to continue efforts to promote the data results and complete models in the Second Phase.

Within the Forest Conservation Project, four sub-projects were established. Each subproject cooperated with many external collaborative researchers and conducted research on political and social analysis of the destruction of forests, methods of forest management with participation of the local community, the environmental impacts of timber trading, and the international treaties and regimes for the purpose of forest conservation. The team also conducted field research, carried out practical activities, including hosting and participating in various international conferences, and presenting policy proposals to policy decision-makers.

The Environmental Education Project researched the real situation of environmental education in thirty-six countries and regions. Specialists in each country provided information and the project compiled investigative reports on environmental education in Asia. This report received high evaluation from researchers in the field, because such information had not been available until then. Furthermore, the project cooperated with specialists from Asia, decided on strategies related to environmental education and made proposals to the relevant people.

The Environmental Governance Project focused research on Japan, China, Thailand, India, Bangladesh, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines and Korea. Based on the reports from researchers in each country, the project analyzed the actual state of environmental governance such as the development of environmental policies and the structure and implementation of environmental law and administration. In addition, regarding problems such as acid rain, there were discussions on the possibility of regional cooperation on environmental protection in Asia.

The New Development Patterns Project was established with the aim of proposing new development patterns, focusing on the potential of realizing a sustainable and recycling based society. It cooperated with the other five projects and took a long term and integrated viewpoint on the research achievements of each project and overlapping themes. The project team formulated IGES reports that were presented as background materials at conferences such as ECO ASIA and the Ministerial Conference on Environment and Development in Asia and the Pacific of the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP).

The above is a summary of the First Phase of IGES Project Research. As you can see, the research themes not only vary according to project but the research targets and methods are completely diverse. At the start of IGES, each project began with new researchers from different backgrounds, not knowing what each other could do. Furthermore, the research contents of the projects were yet to be finalized. I think that even the project leaders were at a loss as to where to start on such a great task. Even regarding the point of what strategic research is, not all the researchers shared a common understanding. In spite of the difficulties that they faced in the early stages, each project has produced research results over three years and IGES has become recognized internationally.

The fact that IGES has finished laying the fundamental groundwork as a practical policy research institute in the First Phase, is a credit to the efforts of all the members of IGES staff. At the same time, in order to turn further internationalize IGES, we must not forget the contributions made by members of the Board of Directors, and trustees, whose advise and support we are truly grateful for. Therefore I would like to take this opportunity to extend my sincere appreciation to all those who are involved in the development of IGES.

Climate Change is considered to be one of the largest issues that needs to be solved by mankind in order to realize a sustainable society. Solution of "Climate Change", caused when increase in human activities (development) affects the global climate, is a fundamental issue, on which the whole existence of mankind depends.

The aim of the CC Project is the analysis of policies for the mitigation of climate change, and the designing of concrete policy proposals based on this analysis. Under the Project Leadership of Prof. Shuzo Nishioka, while taking into account the progress of international negotiations for the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change and the Kyoto Protocol, research activities were conducted on how to form global scale frameworks, domestic systems in Japan and other countries, and regional cooperation, especially in Asia.

The CC Project at IGES has positively taken actions as soon as the research began, such as by organizing brainstorming forums on flexible measures of the Kyoto Protocol, in order to lead discussions of how the domestic measures should be in Japan. To sum up the efforts, a seven-part series of the IGES Open Forum for Global Warming Abatement was held, starting in January 2000. The content of the series, introducing discussions in Japan, was compiled into a booklet and distributed at the Sixth Conference of the Parties of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP6).

The CC Project has also contributed to the advancement of international debate by presenting its research achievements for the realization of the Kyoto Protocol, such as studies on the establishment of baseline by "yard-stick" type competition, direction for the Clean Development Mechanisms (CDM), or summary of Activities Implemented Jointly (AIJ), at international conferences and workshops including COP and the Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice (SBSTA).

In addition, the CC Project developed an energy economic model in order to study the economic effects that CDM has in the Asian region. The project also conducted studies focusing on climate change in Asia, including the study of financial mechanisms of international cooperation for the promotion of participation by developing countries, or research for improving the Greenhouse Gas Inventories in developing countries in Asia.

As a result of these research activities, the Climate Change Project at IGES is becoming one of the major research centers for climate change in Asia, recognized not only in Japan but also internationally. It has been invited to participate in major international conferences and international research projects.

What's New from IGES [Mar. 2001]

In the region of Eastern Asia, including Japan, Korea, China, and ASEAN countries, rapid urbanization and industrialization has taken place, especially in the last 20-30 years of the twentieth century. The urbanization and industrialization brought material wealth to Asian cities, but at the same time, became the causes of environmental problems such as air and water pollution. It may not be an exaggeration to say that the fate of the city is becoming not only the fate of the country, but also the fate of the earth.

Under such circumstances, how to improve the urban environment has become a key element in tackling environmental issues, not only from local but global viewpoints. Therefore, the UE project conducted comparative studies of urbanization and environmental issues in Asian cities, analyzed and evaluated Japanese experience concerning urban environmental management in Japan, and conducted strategic research on urban infrastructure, under the Project Leadership of Hidefumi Imura. Cooperation was also sought from the IGES Kitakyushu Office, set up in the city of Kitakyushu in October 1999, with financial support from the local government.

The UE Project at IGES selected eight cities in Japan, China, Korea and Indonesia, that are characteristically and geographically well balanced. Local research teams coordinated case studies in each city, which were then compiled into a report. At the same time, reports on the issues commonly shared by these cities such as urban traffic and air pollution were compiled, and presented to people in charge of urban policies in national and local governments. The UE Project also organized a five-part series symposia from February 2000, aiming to produce results which can be used as inputs for the Ministerial Conference on Environment and Development in Asia and the Pacific (MCED) of the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP). The results of the symposia were compiled as "Kitakyushu Initiative for a Clean Environment"*

* It aims to promote cooperation between cities while referring to the successful experience of the city of Kitakyushu in the field of environmental measures, and strengthening local level actions for the improvement of urban environment in the Asia-Pacific region. The IGES Kitakyushu Office will act as the Secretariat for the initiative, with research support from the Urban Environmental Management Project. Extreme deforestation, stock farming, pesticides, global warming, floods, draughts, typhoon, air pollution and forest fires have greatly affected forests in all parts of the world in recent years. Forests in Asia were especially affected by these phenomenon, and there is a strong need for forest conservation. Many initiatives for changing forest policies have been proposed and promoted before, but the situation is not improving.

Under such circumstances, the Forest Conservation Project conducted survey research with four sub-teams under the Project Leadership of Hiroji Isozaki. The sub-teams were: "Structural Analysis of Forest Destruction and the Underlying Causes of Deforestation", ""Participatory Forest Management", "Timber Trade", and "Legal and Administrative Supporting Measures for Sustainable Forest Management". One aim of the project was to propose measures for legal and political support, needed for making and implementing strategies for sustainable forest management and forest conservation in the Asia-Pacific region.

Each sub-theme conducted research to grasp and analyze of the actual state of forest use and management in Asian countries, through field surveys conducted in collaboration with networks of researchers, members of governmental organizations etc. in and outside of Japan. The results of the research were closely examined at four international workshops and through policy dialogues with governmental representatives. They were compiled and presented to the interested parties, as policy proposals concerning forest conservation in Indonesia, Lao P.D.R., Vietnam, the Philippines and Far-East Russia. In the Second Phase, focus will be on Indonesia, Lao P.D.R., and the Fareast Russia, and the detailed guidelines and political measures based on the proposal of the First Phase will be formulated and presented at local and national levels.

The FC Project was able to build useful networks with researchers, NGOs, local people and people in governmental organizations in the process of its research activities. The project considers these networks as important assets, which can be used fully in the research of the Second Phase.

Environment Education Project (EE)

Environmental education is an effective strategy for furthering human awareness of environmental problems, developing technology for the purpose of solving environmental problems, and maintaining and improving the quality of life and the environment. For these reasons many nations and NGOs are positively developing environmental education activities. However, in recent years it has become necessary to review environmental education from the wider perspective of 'environmental education for sustainable development', which will not only tackle environmental problems but also deal with a wide range of problems related to development, poverty, population and gender, in an integrated manner. It will also contribute to the progress of the development of a sustainable society.

With this background, the EE Project is examining environmental education from the viewpoint of a sustainable society and the use of resources, with the aim of promoting environmental awareness in the Asia-Pacific Region. Under the Project Leader, Osamu Abe, the EE Project has been conducting research activities for the development of an international network for the purpose of formulating integrated regional strategies for environmental education and implementing environmental education in the Asia-Pacific Region. Additionally, the project conducted research focusing on the four sectors of 'Business and Industry', 'NGOs' 'Media', and 'Schools'.

In the first phase, collection and analysis of status reports on EE was carried out to tackle and evaluate the actual situation of environmental education in the Asia-Pacific Region. These reports were made based on the requests of IGES and cooperation with researchers in the 36 countries and regions who collaborated with specialists and cooperative groups. Based on these reports, integrated strategic proposals concerning environmental education were drawn up, and presented to specialists from each country. The comments formed a basis for discussions at the 'Regional Workshop on Environmental Education in the Asia-Pacific Region' and were compiled as 'Regional Strategy for Environmental Education for the Asia-Pacific Region', and then submitted to related organizations in the Asia and the Pacific Regions.

In addition, regarding research focusing on four sectors, individual case studies and reports on each country were conducted and the results were reflected in regional strategies.



Environmental governance is about how societies deal with environmental problems. It examines the structures and functions of various systems and rules made for the purpose of environmental conservation or realization of sustainable development. The economic development and population growth of the Asia-Pacific region is expected to have a great impact on the global environment in the twenty-first century, and this calls for improvement of environmental governance in countries and regions of Asia.

The Environmental Governance Project, under the Project Leader Hisakazu (Kazu) Kato, analyzed major issues of environmental governance. At the same time, international comparative research was about actors and the decision-making process of environmental governance of Asian countries and regions, for the purpose of making concrete political proposals about the direction of environmental governance in Asia.

In FY 1998, country studies were conducted in Japan, China, India and Thailand, and in FY 1999 the studies were conducted in the same countries and in Bangladesh, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, and Korea, with cooperation from organizations that have signed the IGES Charter. The results of the research were compiled and presented at the "International Symposium on Environmental Governance in Asia", held in March 2000. The results of the country studies were comprehensively compared and analyzed during FY 2000, and were compiled as political proposals for the direction of environmental governance.

Other comparative studies were conducted on various regional cooperation activities, such as the "Northeast Asian Subregional Programme of Environmental Cooperation (NEASPEC) and "ASEAN Strategic Plan of Action on the Environment". Through these studies, reports and policy proposals concerning regional cooperation were compiled, and presented at international conferences such as "Northeast Asian Conference on Environmental Cooperation", held in July 2000, and "Acid Rain 2000", held in December 2000.

Other activities by the project include organization of a study group consisting of representatives from private companies involved with environmental problems. The past attempts by Japanese industrial companies to solve environmental problems were compiled into a book called "Business and Environmental Governance", and was published by Chuo Hoki Publishing Company in October 2000.

New Development Patterns (NDP)

Many countries in the Asia-Pacific region, which have suffered from poverty for decades, have recently experienced high rates of economic growth based on material-intensive production and consumption patterns, by introducing 'throw-away products'. The current development patterns are rapidly increasing pressure on the environment and resource use in the region, and the trend is enhanced by the multiple causes such as the accelerating trend of globalization along with the fast development of information technology.

Based on the current situation regarding the environment and development in the region, the NDP Project, under the leadership of Kazuo Matsushita, aimed at formulating proposals for 'new development patterns' in order to change the course of current development patterns into the sustainable ones. The NDP project conducted research, in collaboration with the other five IGES projects, examining the multiple aspects of the current economic and social systems from an environmental perspective.

The research activities began by clarifying the themes related to new development patterns. Discussions took place with external specialists and the results were used as materials for a series of discussion forums and workshops, and were also used to organize themes. These achievements were complied into the book 'Environment in the 21st Century and New Development Patterns', which was published by the Chuo Hoki Publishing Company in November 1999 (the English version was published in January 2001, by a Dutch publisher, Kluwer Academic Publishers).

Based on the knowledge obtained in this process, the project conducted research on individual themes such as "Transfer of Environmentally-Sound Technology", "Business and the Environment", and "IT and the Environment". The research was conducted through cooperation with research institutes, researchers, governments, and local authorities in the region.

In addition, the NDP delivered the research outcomes to various international conferences on environment and development, in order to widely spread the knowledge and policy implications of new development patterns among policy makers and other stakeholders in the region. For that purpose, the NDP Project worked in close cooperation with the Environment Congress for Asia and the Pacific (ECO ASIA) and the ESCAP Ministerial Conference on Environment and Development (ESCAP/MCED). It has acted as the central core of the 'ECO ASIA Long-term Perspective Project' and reports, including a keynote speech, were delivered to ECO ASIA '99 and '00. A report on the critical issues and measures for attaining sustainable development in the Asia-Pacific region was also submitted to ESCAP/MCED '00.

IPCC Report on Good Practice Guidance and Uncertainty Management in National Greenhouse Gas Inventories

The Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice (SBSTA) of the United Nations Ine Subsidiary Body for Scientific and recinological Advice (SBSTA) of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCC) requested the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) to compile a report entitled the IPCC Report on Good Practice Guidance and Uncertainty Management in National Greenhouse Gas Inventories. This report was published by the Technical Support Unit (TSU) of the IPCC National Greenhouse Gas Inventories Programme (IPCC-NGGIP) hosted by IGES in Hayama.

The report provides improved and state-of-the-art understanding of how uncertainties may be The report provides improved and state-or-the-art understanding or now uncertainties may be managed in producing emissione settimates suitable for the purposes of the UNFCCC and for the scientific work associated with greenhouse gas inventories. Countries will benefit from the Good Practice Guidance and the Uncertainty Management shown in the report, which will enhance the credibility of national greenhouse gas inventories which are indispensable for the implementation of Kyoto Protocol.

The SBSTA endorsed good practice guidance as an elaboration of the Revised 1996 IPCC Guidelines for National Greenhouse Gas Inventories and recommended its use in the preparation of national greenhouse gas inventories. It also concluded that good practice guidance should on national greenhouse gas inventories, it also concluded that good practice guidance should be applied by Annex I Parties of the Convention to the extent possible for inventories due in 2001 and 2002 and the use of it will become mandatory in 2003 and beyond. The use by countries with economies in transition included in Annex I may be phased in two years later than other Annex I parties. SBSTA also encouraged Non-Annex I

Annex I parties. Sbit A also encouraged Non-Annex I Parties to apply good practice guidance as appropriate and to the extent possible, in the preparation of their greenhouse gas inventories. In addition, the Report was distributed to the UNFCCC Parties at its Sixth Session of the Conference of the Parties (COP6).


