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

Background

- Over 10 countries in the Asia Pacific region have been engaged in REDD+ Readiness activities.
- 'Governance issues' often underlie weak policy performance in the forestry sector in many REDD+ countries.
- Many REDD+ countries recognise improving governance issues as a key strategy for REDD+.

Related REDD+ Safeguards in the Cancun Agreements

- b. <u>Transparent and effective national forest</u> governance structure, taking into account national legislation and sovereignty;
- d. The full and effective participations of relevant stakeholders, in particular, indigenous peoples and local communities;

Objective

To examine emerging REDD+ organisational framework and identify ways of moving, focusing on actors and structures facilitating the interaction among actors

- in Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR, Papua New Guinea and Viet Nam-



For each country:


- Literature review to assess deforestation drivers and in each country and past/present policy performance

Organisational framework for REDD+ in Cambodia





Organisational framework for REDD+ in Indonesia (2010-2013)






Organisational framework for REDD in Papua New Guinea

Discussion: emerging REDD+ governance structure and cross-sectoral coordination

- Special unit or taskforce have been established within the government, given the overall management responsibility for REDD+
- Governance arrangements are under development, likely to move towards cross-sectoral approach at various levels, but its extents vary across the countries
- REDD+ organisations need of harmonisation with the existing institutional structure and arrangements over forest at the operational level

Discussion: coordination across levels of government

- Very initial stage to design coordination mechanism with sub-national governments
- Proposed / ongoing REDD+ organisational frameworks consist of national level institutions
- How local governments would be involved in REDD+ process and how coordination across levels of government will be organised is still unclear

Discussion: participation of non-state actors

- REDD+ organisational frameworks provide participation of Non-state actors, but their roles and tasks vary across the countries
- Most of non-state actors involved in arrangements are international donor agencies, international NGOs and REDD+ experts
- Participation of civil society and local actors (indigenous groups, local communities) is through consultations, and relatively less opportunity provided in the structure

Summary

- Interest in REDD+ is increasing, involving a range of state national level- institutions; but this is yet to be fully incorporated into broad development policy targets and land use plans
- Coordination across the levels of government is at early stage. existing institutions over forest and land use sector (both at national and sub-national) should be considered.
- Increasing participation of Non-state actors in REDD+; but extent of their engagement vary across countries.

Ways forward and Challenges

- New REDD+ organisations; existing forest institutions, climate change, relation with non-state actors
- Cross-sectoral approach: historical context, formal decision-making mechanisms, outcome in land use plans
- Multi-stakeholder approach: different interests, capacity, power, resources
- Empowering civil society and local actors: access to information, historically weak position
